Relax, you don't have to read the whole *Companion*! The essays range from 5 to 11 pages in length. Read ONE from EACH of the SIX PARTS. Then read SIX MORE from wherever.

Make a list of the essays you read.

Then: Write a 2 page, double spaced, typed essay in response to one of the essays that particularly interested you. Write about what you learned, the thoughts that the essay inspired, classroom implications—the specifics are up to you. Identify the essay and talk about why it especially interested you.
